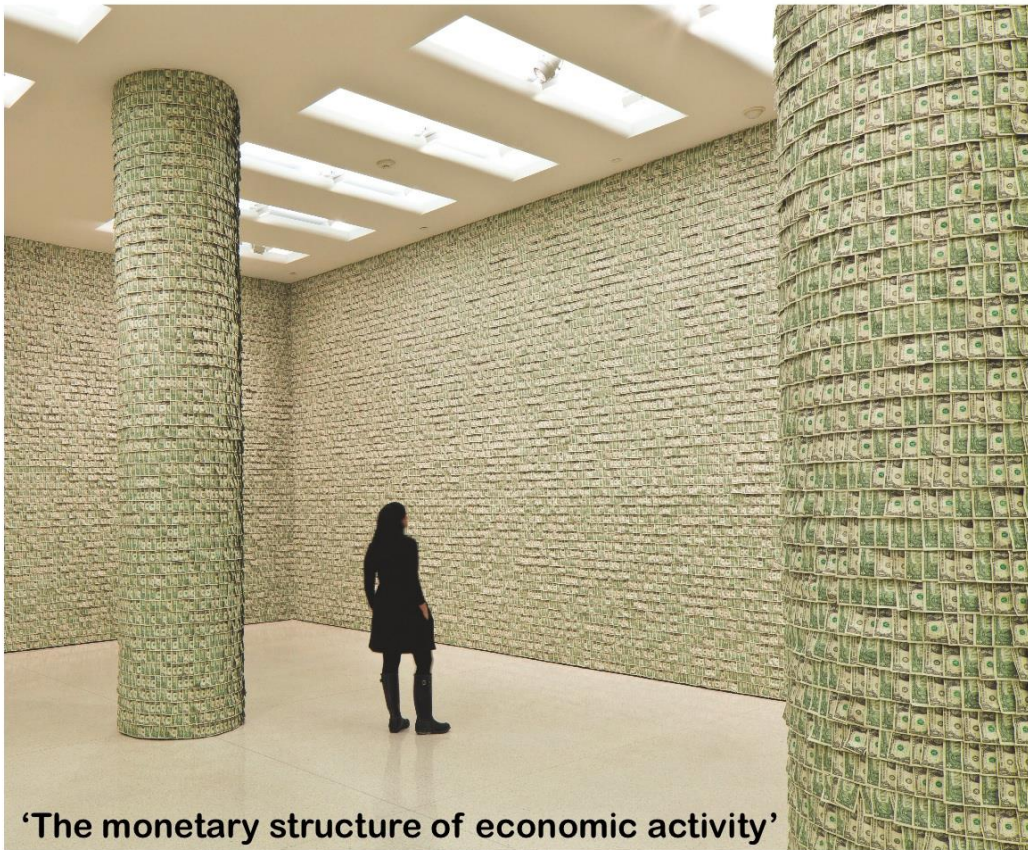

- **Ongoing Research Projects**

'Markets, Constitutions, and Inequality' Launch

'Markets, Constitutions, and Inequality' is a new interdisciplinary research network focused on comparative study into the under-appreciated role that constitutions play in shaping market activities and the conditions for sustainable and inclusive economic development. A two-day workshop was held at the School on 7-8 March and brought together academic and NGO participants from both high-income and low-income countries in a series of interdisciplinary conversations that examined contemporary patterns of economic inequality and considered the role that constitutions play in processes of economic governance.

In June 2019, Anna Chadwick, Marco Goldoni, Javier Solana and Emiliós Christodoulidis will attend a follow up conference on 'Economic Constitutionalism' in Bogota, Colombia.

Glasgow Water Network Inter-Disciplinary Meeting

Jill Robbie, Anna Chadwick and George Pavlakos launched the Glasgow Water Network on 23-24 April. This initiative brings together researchers from sociology, politics, law, engineering, geography, history and economics with stakeholder institutions to address some of the urgent water-related challenges. Current research projects at the university were discussed alongside stakeholder presentations from Kit England (Climate Ready Clyde), Dr Tamo Atabongawung (Yaoundé Ethics Lab), and Dr Rebecca Tharme (Future Earth/Water Future).

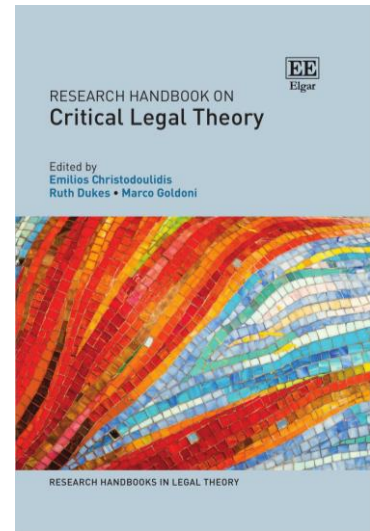

Contents:

The first part of the Handbook examines the question of definition and tracks the origins and development of critical legal theory along its European and North American trajectories. The second part looks at the thematic connections between the development of legal theory and other currents of critical thought such as; Feminism, Marxism, Critical Race Theory, varieties of post-modernism, as well as the various 'turns' (ethical, aesthetic, political) of critical legal theory. The third and final part explores particular fields of law, addressing the question how the field has been shaped by critical legal theory, or what critical approaches reveal about the field, with the clear focus on opportunities for social transformation.
